Learn about the Stonewall riots, a series of spontaneous, violent demonstrations by members of the gay community against a police raid that took place the morning of June 28, 1969, at the Stonewall Inn in the Greenwich Village neighborhood of New York City. The Stonewall riots are widely considered to constitute the single most important event leading to the gay liberation movement and the modern fight for gay and lesbian rights in the U.S. Today, gay pride events are held annually throughout the world toward the end of June to mark the Stonewall riots.
